Include important facts that answer all of these five questions that are applicable: When, Where, What, Who, and the Historical Significance (why this topic is important to history and the world). Remember to include pictures and diagrams when applicable. Not all of your journal pages should be set up this way, remember creativity is key!:

Example I: Latin America

Where: Latin America is mainly located in the southwestern hemisphere.

What:

- Latin America is made up of Mexico, Central America, South America, and the Caribbean Islands.
- This region is called "Latin America" because the majority of the culture and languages comes from Latin.
- Spanish, French and Portuguese are the main languages spoken in this region, which is why Mexico is included in Latin America. Mexico's culture and language come from Latin. Even though Mexico is a part of North America, its Latin culture links it with the Latin American region.

Historical Significance:

- Latin America has played a large role in history throughout the ages.
- Though most of Latin American countries are second and third world countries, Latin America is rich in resources.
- Most significantly, Latin America provides many important crops, oil, and natural resources that are not found anywhere else in the world.

Example 2: Christopher Columbus

When: Late 1400s

Where: Spain, Portugal, and the New World

Who: Christopher Columbus was an explorer hired by Ferdinand and Isabella. He sailed for Spain during Europe's Industrial Revolution and during the Age of Exploration. Europe needed to find more resources and a faster route to Asia because of the wars/crusades taking place in the Mediterranean Sea.

Historical Significance: Christopher Columbus was the one of the first explorers to find the New World, but he didn't know he sailed to a whole new continent. He thought he found a new route to Asia, but he actually found the Bahamas! He's most famous in history for leading the way to finding a new route to India and for helping explore a whole new continent.
